Rector's Thoughts

Why do we read the Bible in Church? This month, we begin a reflection from a book entitled, Introducing the Lessons of the Church Year by Frederick Hook Borsch. His book speaks about different aspects of how the Bible is relevant to understanding what is the purpose of the church.



You can image coming to church as if you were meeting a friend. There, we bring up stories from the past that remind us of our relationship. The highs and the lows, but more importantly, it is at these gatherings that we establish our sense of connection with one another. It's making community. It's recalling common stories around a dinner table, or during a holiday with family we haven't seen in a while. There are times when the family wants to trace their roots deeper and learn more about their past. Such narratives provide threads of continuity, order and belonging.

At church and through the scriptures, customs, symbols and rituals arise out of the stories, and we welcome people into these new and familiar connections. Wherever we go on our travels around the world and enter into church, you can meet with people who have the same connections, bonds and stories, because of our connection with liturgy, the Book of Common Prayer and the Bible stories. Additionally, whatever language people speak, they are all connected with the common language of the Bible. Especially in the Gospel readings, Christians of different centuries draw upon the same stock of adventures, prophecies, songs, commandments, visions and parables.

By word of mouth, stories of the remembrance of exodus and Moses, and the narrative of the child's humble birth shape the community of believers from one generation to the next. When we read the scriptures together, they come alive When we read them together, just like friends reminiscing times together, our stories become touchstones to help us interpret and understand our present experiences.

As Christianity began to spread and as a variety of new documents were written— some claiming divine inspiration, it became evident that there had to be a limit or rule. This came to be called the canons of agreed-upon scriptural writings. The Gospels, letters, prophecies, psalms, wisdom books and histories within this canon were felt to have the breadth, authenticity and depth necessary to cover and to preserve the foundational experiences of Christianity and of Judaism on which it is based.

These biblical narratives are what we might call the "master" stories of the Christian faith. When we hear them with new ears, they are meant to offer experiences which the total community can in some sense relive. Each week, each day, when we read scripture, the Bible stories and contexts guides the interpretation of our lives and inspire the formation of new stories of grace and courageous belief.

Next time you hear the lectionary read, imagine the universal message of meaning that comes from God and be mindful of its contemporary relevance. If you wish to gain more in depth learning, the book is available on Amazon.

Voices From the Vestry

My first vestry experience was in 2008. I was at Christ Church where Father Bob was the rector. We had been friends for many years and my children attended his confirmation class. We both were educators at continuation schools and fierce advocates of twelve step programs. He often tried to recruit me to teach Sunday school. Then, as my daughter was heading to an east coast college, he sought me out for the vestry. He explained that it is a three year commitment, but the first year is mostly for listening and learning. He tried to balance the talents of the vestry members so there is a

spectrum of expertise. He wanted me to bring my heart. Flattered, I agreed to serve. One continuing vestry item was the aging, too small restrooms. Bishop Bruno was refusing to visit unless there was a lavatory space that could accommodate his football player physique. A vestry member's spouse sketched possible layouts of the existing facilities. Then the parish hall kitchen had an electrical fire and suffered extensive damage. The insurance company wanted to quickly restore it to the previous footprint, but the parish had another vision. Using a grant from the bishop, the insurance money, and parish contributions we worked with an architect to design a wonderful kitchen, pantry, parish hall with a coffee bar and four new single person restrooms. Two were ADA compliant and two were not quite big enough to qualify.

When Father Bob retired, we had an interim priest for a year as the search committee looked at the **35 priests** available to be called. In 2017, I transferred to St Michael's after meeting with Mother Dina who I also had know for quite awhile. Four years ago she asked me to serve on the vestry as she neared retirement and a search for a new rector would begin. Of course, Covid appeared on the global scene and California had a very long lockdown.

Zoom coffee hour before the livestream of Morning Prayer, Eucharist on the tot lot, livestream of weekday Compline and Taize services are positive memories of our ability to creatively adapt. The search for a new rector was very different this time as many priests had retired during Covid and there were barely a handful of priests who already lived within driving distance of St Michael's. Luckily, Father Joshua was newly ordained and the perfect fit for our parish.

All these reflections and memories were brought about as my time on the vestry draws to a close coupled with the recent celebration of a big birthday that ends in a zero. I am 99.99% certain that I will never again be on a vestry. However, I will be cheering for the next vestry that will be elected at the annual meeting on February ninth.

Disaster and Its Impact

We have all been watching and listening to the news about the terrible fires and the impact they are having on families. Thinking about how terrible it is to lose everything except what you wore to work that day, for me brought back memories of "been there, done that." It was decades ago, but hearing of similar situations stirs up old memories.



The home I grew up in and where my family lived was on a busy highway. I remember my sister calling me at work one day and saying "can you come home?" I asked why, and she said, pretty calmly, " a truck hit the house." I asked "was there much damage" and her response was a burst of tears as she said "there's nothing left!"

I went home and as I approached, saw throngs of people standing on our front lawn and in the driveway. When I was able to park and see what everyone was looking at—it is almost impossible to describe. The front of the house didn't look too bad, but the side view!

There was the front porch, the back porch, and the attic connecting them. Everything in between was a pile of rubble under a huge truck, the back half of which was sticking out the side of the house. Of course, my first thought was if anyone was injured, but thank God my parents, sister, and our two dogs were all ok.

Everything destroyed was just "stuff." It takes a while for the loss of everything you had to sink in. My wardrobe now consisted of whatever I had worn to work that day. In the rubble was a lifetime of things accumulated to that point--clothing, pictures, and everything else that seemed important at the time. The disaster also showed who were the kind, caring people we lived near . I moved in with a girlfriend's family, my family found accommodations, as we all resumed life without possessions.

That kind of experience certainly puts into perspective the things you considered important and non-replaceable as you resume life without possessions.

Hopefully the families involved in the recent fires will be able to re-establish their lives without too much trauma and will have people to comfort and support them. Gerri Pisciotta
